NOTE: TECHNOLOGY (Mandatory)

Students must develop a minimum of four design projects by the end of Stage 4. Design projects involve the design, production and evaluation of quality solutions to meet identified needs or opportunities. Projects will be incorporated into the following areas:

- Agriculture and Food Technologies
- Engineered Systems
- Digital Technologies
- Material Technologies

NOTE: VISUAL ARTS - Students at Corowa High School study Visual Arts for six periods a fortnight throughout Year 8. They study a variety of artistic techniques including a term of ceramics.

NOTE: VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS - All schools can request contributions to enhance their educational and sporting programs. School contributions are voluntary and payment is a matter for decision by parents.

NOTE: If students elect to study Cooking up a Storm, Earth & Environment Science, Forensic Science, Food Technology, Industrial Technology Metal and Timber it is mandatory that they wear leather shoes during practical lessons. If students are unable to provide their own leather shoes, they can borrow leather shoes from the school for the duration of the lesson.
